Parents and students, enjoy your summer this year. Find the joy in having some time away from school, spending time with family and friends and remember, your attitude determines everything!











Celebrating a Community of Learning

For the past few decades technology has been an external pressure for change in education. It has shaped and supported instruction in classrooms as well as extended learning outside of brick and mortar. As the school year winds down, it is an annual process for me to reflect on all that has been accomplished and celebrate the "good works" of the school year.


What I have learned about online learning is that students really love talking about themselves and learning more about what classmates think.

The virtual learning format has fostered opportunities for students to do just that! Here are a few examples:



BOOK CLUBS: Mrs. Malterer, fifth grade teacher, uses Book Clubs to keep kids connected and engaged in sharing their thinking.

"I have seen a lot of growth with students as they have evolved from a question and answer book club to an actual book discussion. Moving from question and answer to discussion requires more thinking and understanding about what has been read and how students interpret the text."



VIRTUAL MEETINGS: Google meets have been the tool

of choice to keep teachers and students connected. Mrs. Kennelty's math classes at Central Middle School uses this platform to support and frontload learning with students.

"At the beginning of online learning, I used data to invite specific students to Google meets, but now have moved to inviting all students. The meetings are designed to help prepare for the task students are working on in class."



One side is without color while the other is filled with it. On side I'm bluer than the skies, the other I'm not. On the left I feel as if I'm a butterfly that is trapped from a net. ROUTINE: A pearl of wisdom learned from virtual learning was to keep virtual instruction similar to face-to-face instruction when appropriate. Mrs. Fyksen, at CMS, has accomplished this through implementing classroom routines, assignments and weekly writes all replicated from her face-to-face instruction.

"I have been keeping things like they were in the classroom with daily reading and journaling. Twice a week I incorporate read-alouds via Google meets as well as Fyksen Friday Freewrites where students gather in Google meet, listen to music and kids write on paper."

REAL TIME ONLINE LEARNING: Students in Mrs. Guyette's second grade classroom shared science experiments online. This allowed students to demonstrate and show classmates how states of matter change as it was actually happening in real time - very cool



WRITING CELEBRATIONS: Mr. Frank, third grade teacher, facilitates a writing celebration. Each student reads 4 papers that classmates wrote and used electronic sticky notes to share positive comments. Mr. Frank wrote to some authors that his third grade students studied this year and the authors did a virtual question and answer session as well as a read aloud of a new book that has not been published yet.



What Starts at Rossman Changes the World

I believe what starts at Rossman changes the world. I know it is true because I have seen it and lived it each day. The best way I can honor you, is to let you know how it's done.

You have, and will change, the world with your resilience and perseverance. You get up the exact same amount of times you fall, trip, get pushed down, or fail at something. You don't let your fears change your own self-worth.

Brene Brown, famous researcher and author, would tell you that your success could be measured by not only by how many times you get back up, but how many times you have failed. She has researched four hundred thousand pieces of data over 20 years and has never seen a single person build a life, family, or a career that did not require them to have to pick themselves back up and begin again. Dr. Brown's research on vulnerability provides evidence that when you are vulnerable you are able to take risk because, being vulnerable requires courage, curiosity, and you cannot be risky without it. What makes you different is that you are not afraid to fall because you have built the skills to get back up again. In the classroom, is where you learned to think critically, where you learned to connect the dots of the seemingly unconnected experiences, where you learn to make meaning, how you understand what struggle means, why we can't have anything without it, and that's where you build muscles on top of muscles.

At Rossman, and in life, you will continue to fall, make mistakes, and struggle. You are different because you know when you have struggled or failed. You think critically, become vulnerable, and get back up again because you now make meaning and understand what struggle means by connecting the dots.

I know the world may not be ready for your plan but make no mistake, what starts at Rossman will change the world because you own your emotion and do not let it own you. You own your hurt and not let it own you. You do whatever it takes because failure and struggle can be tough and disappointing but you reset, get back up, and begin again.

For all of our 5th graders, visiting most of your homes this summer will be an experience I will never forget but it will never replace the time we had here at Rossman. You've done it! From the desk of **MR. VISTE, PRINCIPAL**

Central staff have been busy these past few months, working to make sure students are progressing and learning off-site. I believe we were prepared for the challenge and our staff did a lot to think outside of the box by providing engaging work. ALL of our staff stepped up to the plate, but I want to give you a flavor of some of the activities that have occurred recently, highlighting just a few of them.

SCIENCE: Students have been doing some pretty creative labs, in the comfort of their homes. Teachers have been sending students videos with instructions how to construct the different labs, and in some cases, teachers delivered supplies to student's

homes. One of our 8th grade science teachers delivered owl pellets to all of her students, to prepare for an at home lab. Central students learned to make elephant toothpaste, volcanoes, bubbles, and lava lamps, using basic household products.

PROJECT LEAD THE WAY: This fall, we offered two Project Lead The Way classes: "Design and Modeling" and "Computer Innovators." In the Design and Modeling class, students were given a choice of 15 at-home activities, to continue their learning in the class. Just to name a few, students designed school playgrounds, built cars out of food, designed kitchen gadgets, built bridges, and built pendulums to use as timers. The teachers have been really impressed with what the students developed and the problem solving they exhibited in their creations.

7TH GRADE MATH: As a final assignment, students were responsible for constructing a building in the city of Mathville! Each building in the city should have been covered with a specific coating, and every student needed to find the surface area of their building to determine how much the coating would cost. To top it off, everyone was encouraged to get creative with their building and submit pictures of what they had constructed. The math teacher stated it was awesome to see how creative everyone got with their projects, and it was also a great activity to wrap up the school year!

HONORING OUR STUDENTS: We have been trying to honor our students, as we always do, and provide some special opportunities and acknowledgments. We started our virtual morning announcements the first week of April and many students tuned in to hear updates, fun facts, interact with each other. As we aren't at school, we wanted to honor our 8th grade students and make them feel special, as we wrap things up. Our PTO and student council generously donated yard signs for all of our 8th grade students. We have been sending out encouragement and positive postcards to keep students focused and on target. Finally, our staff have been working to plan a live virtual 8th grade recognition ceremony that took place at the end of the year. We also provided an all school assembly in the same format.

I feel very lucky to be the leader at Central Middle School. The staff work hard each and everyday, and they put STUDENTS first. We hope you all have a wonderful, restful, and fun summer break. Congrats to our 8th graders!
